

JACOB ALFORD

1. Jacob, son of Lodowick and Susannah (Hartley) Alford, was born December 12 1738 in New Kent County, Virginia. He died in Robeson County, Morth Carolina July 4 1794. He married Mary Pace, probably in 1758.

Jacob was a pioneer settler in Robeson/Bladen County, Morth Carolina. Sometime before April 1779 he moved from his original settlement to his final home, about two and and one half miles northwest of Ashpole Church, in a community to be known as Alfordsville.

The Tories took James away to hang him because he would not tell them where the Whigs were hiding. Mingo, a Negro slave, went on a mule to warn the Whigs. They went in pursuit and overtook the Tories near Gallivants Ferry, South Carolina. After swimming their horses across the stream, they surprised them as they were about to

hang James. The 16 Whigs then rounded up the 22 Tories, brought them back, hung them, then buried them in the same grave.

James moved his entire family to Mississippi about 1818.

MOTE FROM FRANCES ALFORD: "Letter from Caroline Bridges Alford to her sister."

> Mclones Bridge, N. C. November 17th 1857

Dear Sister.

It has been two long weeks since I left home, and as I cannot see you, it is a pleasure that I take my seat to write to you this evening. 1 am very anxious to get home and see you again. 1 have been visiting so much that I am getting tired of it, and have not got half round yet. We are well and I have enjoyed very good health since l left home, except a slight cold.

We are now at Paisley's (Mr. A's brother). I like him and his wife very well. They are very religious, and I know that you would like them. Mr. A's mother and father are as good to me as they could be to anybody. I do not know who to write about. I will tell you all about them when 1 come home. 1 reckon Mr. A's oldest half-brother will come to Miss. with us.

We took them all by surprise when we came over. They did not know we were in the country until we were at Neil Alford's. I have been to church three times since I have been over here. I don't like Presbyterians much. They are too cold. They are not like Methodists. 1 have not seen a Methodist since I have been here that I know of. Everybody nearly are Presbyterians.

I have got acquainted with Mary and Susan Bridges, dau. of James Bridges. I believe they want to claim kin with me whether I am any relation or not. Susan is a very smart girl. I reckon we will call on them, as they insist on us doing so. I have not seen their father vet.

This country looks very poor. It is a very pretty country though. It is so level it is very pleasant traveling in carriages and buggies. I have not seen a lady ride horseback since I have been here. It is a very uncommon thing.

I have commenced my collar, and I think it well be right pretty. 1 have no idea that I will finish it before I come home, as I have to visit so much. The fashions are about the same here as they are in Miss - some little difference. I have seen some right pretty collar patterns.

Mr. Alford says he is going to write to Mr. Norman this week. We will start home between the 1st and the 10th of December. I reckon we are going to return by way of Memphis. I have got lots to tell you, but I do not know how to write it. It looks so simple when I write it down. I want to see you all very bad, and I hope the time will soon pass away. Tell MA not to be uneasy about me and not to stay home by herself auch of the time. You must go to see her often. Sive my love to her. I remain as ever. YOUR AFFECTIONATE SISTER.

NOTE FROM FRANCES ALFORD: "Written by Alexander Alford (1827-1912) to his father Sigo."

Rockport, August 12th, 1860

Dear Father

I will attempt to write you a short letter. I have not much news to write you. We are all well except our little girl. She is not well. Seems to be rather puny at this time, teething I suppose. Caroline wants to have her Ambrotype taken and send it to you. She thinks hers is better looking than anyboddies babe. But I fear Emma will not sit long enough to take. She does not grow very fast.

The most disturbing news I have to write is the protracted drought. We have had no rain of consequence since the first of May. My ground has not been wet since that time. Corn is the most complete failure I have ever seen. I will not make more than one-third enough to do me. Peas and potatoe grops will be short and unless it rains soon they will make nothing. Cotton is cut off at least half if not more. The dry weather has been general in great measure throughout the state, though in many places not so severe. I think this neighborhood has suffered as intensely as any I have beard from. If I fail to make a pea and potatoe crop I will have to buy about a thousand bushels of corm.

Henry (sic Henry Siles Alford) is here and now out of employ. He has been employed up to this time tolerably constant. He thinks there is a chance to get business up as a clerk in a mercantile house on the railroad. If he succeeds he will do better business even if his wages, are not so high. He will be constantly employed. His health is bad. The health of our connections here is good. Jacob Ard died last Thursday of consumption. Politics are tolerably high in Mississippi at this time. Breckenridge and Lane will carry the state by the usual Democratic majority. My own private opinion is that Lincoln will be elected. I believe I have nothing more.

The following paragraphs contain the name and address of all the new ALFS who have joined our effort since the last newsletter. Information and questions concerning their lineage is included to the extent that it was furnished. In addition to the new ALFS there are entries on some of those who have been with us for some time, but for which we had not published an inquiry. There are also some corrections for previous errors. Send your response to us or to the person listed. If you send it to the person, please send us a copy so that we can update our record.

- 4-1 Miss Bobbie Alford; 295 Fernando Way; Daly City, CA 94015 is a member of the Julius Alford line. Julius 1717 VA, Jacob ca1756, John Seaborn 1807 LA, Willis Jacob 1847 LA, Eugene Booth 1882 LA, Tharon Eugene 1905 LA.
- 4-2 Mrs. Helen I. (Leonard) Alford; 10579 Star Avenue; Osceola, IN 46561. Leonard comes from one of the very few Northern lines that we have seen. His second great grandfather Hiram Alford was born June 11 1800 in Vergennes VT. He married Susannah Adams December 28 1820 in Meadville PA. He died December 11 1884 in Goshen, Indiana. Does anyone have information on the parents of Hiram?
- 4-3 Lodwick H. Alford; (Captain, U. S. Navy, Retired); P 0 Box 742; Sea Island, 6A 31561. (The only living Lodwick Alford we know about) He was named for James Lodwick born 1749 and died 1820 in Make County, NC, which according to family tradition is his ancestor. His great grandfather was GREEN ALFORD born 1787 and died 1848 in Wake County, NC, but they have not proved that he was actually the son of James Lodwick. His records show that James Jr. born 1713 was the father of his James Lodwick and the brother of our famous Lodwick born about 1710 in Virginia. Lodwicks family has an annual reunion of an association of the descendants of his father W. L. H. Alford and his mother Lucy Nell Overby. The met last in April in Sylvester, Seorgia.
- 4-4 Miss Patricia Alford; 239 Drake Avenue; San Antonio, TX 78204. She sent data tracing her line from Nathaniel S. Alford born 1861 in Alabama. He married Emma J. Richards in Milam County, Texas in 1881. Their son was Ottie Alford born 1883 in Texas, then F. R. Alford born 1903 in Milam County, Texas and then Patricia. Rose Shelton tells us that the father of Nathaniel is Redden Alford, born 1820 in South Carolina, married Nancy Harrison and died August 21 1895. If you have information on Redden we would like to hear from you. Until we can learn more Patricia is in the loose line group.
- 4-5 Mr. William Howard Alford, Jr3 Box 314 Lewisburg, TN 37091. Although we have a few minor differences in data, William is obviously of the William Alford line, William being a brother of Thomas 1725. He traces his line from John Alford who died 1748 and married Mary (Dawson), then William born 1734 VA, John born 1760 VA, John Bibb born 1790 VA, William Madison born 1818 AL, John Nelson born 1850 TN, William Howard born 1883 TN.
- 4-6 Margaret Baumgardner; Route 1, Box 264; Gurdon, AR 71743 is looking for information on Levisa Alford. About all we know is that she was born 1808 in Virginia or North Carolina and died 1881 in Pike County, Brocktown, Arkansas. She married Abner Henderson December 23 1831 in Morgan County, Alabama. It is possible that she was earlier married to Joseph Haney of Limestone County or Morgan County. We need anything we can get on Levisa.
- 4-7 Mrs. Marilla Alford Blau; Route 1 (Lexington); Ashland, KS 67831. Marilla is of the Thomas Alford line, and contributed to the accumulation of data that is included in the record that begins elsewhere in this issue. From Wayne Alford born 1821 her line comes down through Dr. John William 1842 IN, Wayne C. 1882 KS to her. Marilla cautions us about the use of our term "ALFS" to designate those interested in Alford. Most of Alfords pronounce the name using a broad a as in far or farther. Our abbreviation, which is used for the sake of convenience, is not to suggest you use the short a as in fat or ladder when pronouncing your name. It does seem to be easier saying ALF rather than AMLF.

- 4-8 Miss Esther Brown; 317 W. Wisconsin; Greensburg, KS 67054 is also on the Thomas Alford line. She provided data down to her grandfather. Starting with Thomas 1725 then John 1763, James 1791, Wayne 1821 and Dr. John William, her grandfather. She provided a correction to our John Alford list in issue number 2. Our 1840E shown for her grandfather should have been 1862.
- Alford, born about 1807 in North Carolina. She married (1) Samuel H. Fortson in Greene County, Alabama and (2) William McLemore after the death of her first humband about 1838, the later marriage in Lauderdale County, Mississippi. In the 1850 census of Lauderdale County, Mississippi, a Sherod Alford, born about 1816 in North Carolina lived near the McLemores with his mother, Milbra [Milberry?] Alford, born about 1779 in North Carolina. In the same county were Julius and James Alford. Records indicate that Julius, Sherod and possibly Abraham Alford were children of Milbra and her humband Jacob Alford born about 177-. What can you tell Rod about Mary or Jacob Alford?
- 4-10 Dr. James Mac Donald Edwards; 1941 Twin Falls Road; Decatur, 6A 30032. Although we don't have his complete lineage, we know that Dr. Edwards is a descendant of James Alford, son of Lowowick and Rebecca Ferrell, then Cullen [Collin] Alford, then James Alford, then Nancy Ann Elizabeth Alford. Dr. Edwards is writing a book in which he will have at least one chapter with Alford information. He says he will be glad to correspond with Alford kin provided they include a stamped self-addressed envelope and full reference material. In another letter he cautions that he will be reluctant to give out source material that he plans to use in his book.
- 4-11 Kay Ann (Mrs. Jack D.) Feiden; 7761 Killarney Court; Wichita, KS 67206 probably belongs to the Thomas Alford line. Her great grandmother was Adeline Humphreys Alford born 1843 in OH, then her father Robert Perry born 1815, and his father Fielding Alford born ca 1780 in VA. The Thomas Alford family sketch prepared by Jewell Gallaugher shows Fielding Alford born 1786 to be the son of John Alford and Miss Hayes. If you have information to prove this connection let us know.
- 4-12 Jewell (Mrs. M. L.) Gallaugher; 1664 Oak; Bartlesville, OK 74003 prepared the documentation we have on the Thomas Alford line. From Thomas her line comes down through John 1763 VA, John 1798 VA, Joseph McClure 1834 VA, George 1871 In then her. The work of Jewell and those who worked with her will be the source of answers for many future ALFS.
- 4-13 Velma (Mrs. J. M.) Glenn; Route 1, Box O. B.; Tow, TX 78672 probably belongs to the Jacob Alford line. She thinks her third great grandmother was Charity Alford daughter of Jacob and Mary Pace. We need proof that Susannah Thompson is the daughter of Charity Alford and Charles Thompson, Jr. Susanna was born September 20 1800 in North Carolina and married Eli Stephens ca 1817.
- 4-14 Mrs. Alice C. Grady; 396 Taylor Road; Stow, MA 01775 is one of contacts on: our Chapman line (Mary's mother's family). She also publishes the BOGGS newsletter. She is looking for information on Hulbert Alford who married Julia Caroline, daughter of Dr. Beriah Greham and Lilly Boggs who were married about 1837 in St. Louis, Missouri. Hulbert and Julia Caroline Alford had a daughter Mary Lilly Alford in Texas.
- 4-14A Mr. Bobby Alford; 1106 Mickory Street; Lawrenceburg, TN 38464 is seeking information on Alsey Alford, born Franklin or Wake County, North Carolina in 1804; lived in Lawrence County, Tennessee 1818-1836; married with three sons under 5 years of age in 1830 cenus of Lawrence County. Also, Milly Alford born in either Tennessee or North Carolina in 1816; married John Greenhaw in Lawrence County, Tennessee in 1840.

- 4-15 Mr. Harold E. Haynes; 1234 Folkestone Way; Cherry Hill, NJ 08034 needs our help with his loose Alford line. His first great grandmother was Sarah Minerva Alford born December 27 1813 in Indiana County, PA. She married William H. Borland in 1833. He knows her parents were John Alford born 1776/7 died 1871 who married Mary ___ born 1782/3 and died 1835. The ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN, Issue Mumber 3, July 1971, page 14 shows a John Alford who married Mary Brown July 28 1786 in Campbell County, Virginia. If the birth dates Harold has are firm then this marriage is too early to fit his needs. What do you have to help him?
- 4-16 Mrs. Judi Hogan; Route 1, Box 22B; Brewster, WA 98812. In our second issue we had an entry on this line of Judi's husband. We now know that their great grandfather was T. J. (Thomas) Alford born about 1831 in Harris County, Georgia. He married a Mary Adams there in about February 4 1850. Judi believes that the parents of Thomas are William H. Alford and his wife Elizabeth, born born in North Carolina. Send us all the information you have on these Alfords, please.
- 4-17 Dr. Marian Alford Mixon Houk; 6218 Beachway Drive; Falls Church, VA 22041. She is of the Jacob Alford line. Her line from Jacob would be James 1764, Julius Caesar 1808, Dr. James Thomas 1840 MS, Jacob Elias 1880 MS. and her mother Ella Quin Alford Mixon.
- 4-18 Mr. Max Knox; 241 W. 17th Street; Chico, CA 95926. Max and his wife Margery were first with us as part of our Newkirk effort. Max has both Newkirk (Marys family) and Alford connections. His Alford connection is actually through the ALVORD line. He has sent us about 30 pages of family group sheets and related papers on the Alvord line. As soon as we can get caught up with some of our Alford introductory items we will begin a series on his Alvord papers.
- 4-19 Mrs. J. Fred (Lora McPhaul) Newman; 804 N. Rosedale; Toccoa, SA 30577. Lora is of the Jacob Alford line. Her third great grandfather was Warren Alford, son of Jacob and Mary Pace. Warrens daughter, Catherine Alford, born 1801, married Daniel McCormick.
- 4-20 Mrs. John (Novis) Odom, 702 North 6th Street, Homer, LA 71040. In the last issue we incorrectly listed her as an Alford rather than Odom. We regret that very much Novis. We would still like some information on William Alford and Mary Ellis as mentioned in the last issue.
- 4-21 Mr. Frank M. Pangburn, Jr.; 1087 San Ramon Drive; Chico, CA 95926 has a loose Alford line. His second great grandfather was Landy or Landa Alford born about 1805 in Mythe County, Virginia. He married Sarah Duke about 1826. She was born in Warren County, North Carolina. Landy and Sarah crossed the country on the Overland trail in 1846 and resided in Contra Costa and/or Solano County, California. Their daughter Adeline born February 16 1833 was the last Alford in Franks line.
- 4-22 Mr. Leland Porter; 310 Manhattan Drive; Lexington, KY 40505. Mr Porter is also of the Thomas Alford line. From Thomas his lineage goes through John Alford Sr., Charles 1803 VA, James 1824 VA, Adaline 1853 KY then they became Porters. He was one of the contributors to the Jocumentation of the Thomas Alford line.
- 4-23 Mrs. Gerry Showlater; 2653 Luna Avenue; San Diego, CA 92117. We made a mistake on her in the Linage table in the last issue. We indicated that it was Richard who was a descendant of the Alfords, but it should have been Gerry.
- 4-24 Mr. Currie A. Stammer; P. O. Box 5; Chapel Hill, TN 37034 needs your help with a loose Alford line. His great grandfather was William Hamilton Alford born 1828 in Rutherford County, TN. He married Mary Ferguson Riggs October 20 1852. His son was John Thomas born 1853 in TN and his daughter, Currie's mother, was Lelia Alford born 1886 in TN.

- 4-25 Lucy Shull Stevens is the daughter of Mrs. Lewis Bowman who published the ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN. We goofed on her entry in the lineage table published on pages 2 and 3 of the last issue. Lucy's name and the names of her ancestors were in the proper alphabetical location, but the computer and 1 forgot to move down the date line that should have followed. Alford born ca 1824 in TN and his father was George W. Alford who married a Mary B. Mary remarried Joseph B. Page.
- 4-28 Mr. Charles Wesley Wright; Route 3; Independence, KS 67301 is of the Thomas Alford line. His grandmother was Mary Belle Alford, daughter of Joseph McClure Alford, son of John Alford, Jr. 1798 VA, son of John Alford, Sr. 1763 VA, son of Thomas Alford 1725.
- 4-29 Dr. Benjamin C. Holtzclaw; 1900 Lauderdale Drive, E-118; Richmond, VA 23233. Dr. Holtzclaw's wife was of the Julius Alford line through his son John who married Chloe Pope, then Abraham born 1787. (I can't be sure of Mrs. Holtzclaw's line from this point on from the data Dr. Holtzclaw sent and genealogy is no place for conjecture.) We first became aware of Dr. Holtzclaw through extensive Newson family (my Mother's maiden name) material published in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography when we was on the staff of the University at Richmond, Virginia, Later Dr. Randall Alford gave us his address and mentioned that he believed Dr. Holtzclaw was a contributor to the Boddie publications. Dr. Holtzclaw informs us that he is 88, a bit feeble, but manages to get around with a cane.
